#### Latest Family History News – Are we more generous than Britain?

The Australian Newspaper Digitisation project currently being undertaken by the National Library of Australia provides free access to historical newspapers on the internet. You may therefore be surprised to find out that the British Library is not so generous in that it has formed a partnership with online publisher, brightsolid, owner of findmypast.co.uk and Friends Reunited. A 10 year agreement will see up to 40 million pages of UK newspapers digitised, covering three centuries and including 52,000 local, regional, national and international titles. The British Library newspapers will be digitised and then made available online via a paid-for website as well as integrating it into its family history websites. They will however be free to view on-site at the British Library which is a bit out of the way for most Aussies!

#### Latest Changes in Ezitree

It has been a very quite couple of months for us due to the activities previously mentioned. However, I have made one enhancement and several fixes to Ezitree since the last meeting: fixed Drop Line Descendants Chart error in some instances; improved display of default spouse names; increased length of names on Birth Brief Chart; fixed name left off linked witnesses if name had a bracket such as 'Smith(?)'; removed display of possible names from Relationships in 'Other Names' list; added thumbnail view of images to Event Details window, and fixed Source images returning incorrect details under 'Image Properties' in the Media Display window.

#### Today's Topic

The three items I have planned to show you today are the new media thumbnail image feature mentioned above, how to include a signature in the Event View and how to Graft events. The grafting of events is also covered in the Ezitree 'How To...' section on the back of this newsletter. Once I show you how to do grafting of events you will wonder how you ever got by without using it – anyway, that is what one Ezitree user said to me in an email this month.




## How to Graft Events.

In the following example, I will show how you to copy a Marriage Banns event from one person to another. A Marriage Banns event is not one that will automatically link to another person like a Marriage or Relationship event. You need to manually do this and then manually keep the event up-to-date. However, using the Graft function, you can copy the full Marriage Banns details from one person to another which saves you unnecessary typing. The Graft function could also be used to copy photograph events to several people who may be shown in the one photograph.


In our example, Roger Brown married Charlotte Ryan on 12 Jul 1837. There is also a Marriage Banns entry for 5 July 1837. The Event View for Charlotte only shows the Marriage. Now we are going to add the Marriage Banns event to Charlotte's record, therefore we need to have her record open. To start the Graft, click the Utilities menu and then click the 'Graft' option. The 'Grafting an Event' window will open:




From here, click the [Select] button to open up the main Person selection window. You may need to navigate to the person from whom you want to Graft the event.



In this example, Roger Brown has been located:



Once the desired person is selected, a new window opens listing all the events of that person. You will use this list to select one event to 'Graft', in this example we have selected 'Marriage Banns.'



The Graft window will then be returned showing the details of the event to be grafted. There are several options available most of which should be left ticked. Once you click the [Graft] button, you will be prompted to confirm your action:



The selected event will then be 'Grafted' or 'Copied' to the current person.
